STABLES:

- Indoor: a limited number of indoor stables will be available. Arrive Thursday evening or Friday before 8:30 a.m. Leave after 5 pm. Sunday. Shavings supplied. Stall decoration encouraged so that exhibits will attract the attention of the public. Cost: \$50.
- A separate \$50 per stall clean deposit/stall reservation cheque is to accompany entry forms. The deposit will be refunded from the show office when stalls are inspected and clean. Any unclaimed deposit will be shredded at the main office.
- Outdoor: uncovered. Located east of the Sand Rings. Cost: \$10 per day. Shavings supplied. Please clean your stall before leaving.

SHOWMANSHIP – ENGLISH/WESTERN

Pattern to be posted.

The horse is the means by which the exhibitor demonstrates his/her ability to show a horse at halter. The ideal showmanship performance consists of a poised, confident, neatly attired exhibitor leading a well groomed and conditioned horse that quickly and efficiently performs the requested patterns with promptness, smoothness and precision. The exhibitor will show the horse in the posted pattern.

ENGLISH EQUITATION: Pattern to be posted.

The class will proceed at least once around the ring at each gate – walk, trot, sitting trot and canter, and on command reverse and repeat. They shall then line up on command and execute individual tests at the judge's discretion. The judge may ask questions concerning horsemanship, anatomy of the horse, tack, stable management and any others.

ENGLISH PLEASURE

To be shown at a flat footed walk, normal trot and easy canter; not to gallop; light contact to be maintained. To be judged on 45% performance, 40% manners and 15% conformation.

ROAD HACK

To be shown at a flat footed walk with a reasonably loose rein, trot, strong trot, easy canter and hand gallop. To be judged 55% performance, 15% conformation, 20% substances and 10% manners.

SATURDAY 9:00 AM START (Sand Ring 2)**WESTERN EQUITATION:** Pattern to be posted.

Riders will be judged on seat, hands, ability to control and show horse. Results as shown by performance of the horse are NOT to be considered more important than the method used by the rider. The judge will ask each rider to work individually and rail work.

ON COMMAND CLASS**PRIZE MONEY:** 1ST – \$25

The command class is neither a race, nor is it a gymkhana event. It is a competition which exhibits a well-trained, responsive performance horse/pony. Riders must be dressed in suitable western attire.

Entries are eliminated, one at a time at the discretion of the judge as commands are not executed correctly. At no time are ring stewards allowed to partake in the judging or placings of the class.

In-hand trail is a relatively new class that has been added to many breed associations and some open shows as well. It is a class that, just as the name implies, allows you to lead your horse through the trail obstacles. The obstacles are generally the same as for standard trail classes with the exception of lope-overs.

The in-hand trail class usually includes the following obstacles: a gate, walk and trot-overs, back throughs, side passing, a mail box or raincoat, a bridge, turning in a box, and walking and/or trotting through and around cones. The course may include all or just some of these obstacles and in general the bigger the show, the more and harder the obstacles!

SATURDAY 1:30 PM START (Sand Ring 1)**RANCH HORSE PLEASURE CLASS**

The purpose of Ranch Horse Pleasure: the horse should reflect the versatility, attitude and movement of a working horse, the horse's performance should simulate a horse riding outside the confines of an arena and that of a working ranch horse. This class should show the horse's ability to work forward at working speed while under control by the rider. Light contact should be rewarded and horse shall not be shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners and responsiveness of the horse while performing the maneuver requirements and the horse's quality of movement are the primary considerations.

Show Jumping is the competitive riding of horses one at a time over a set course of obstacles in which the winner is judged according to ability and speed.

STAKE RACE

The correct pattern shall be run across the center timing line, turning left or right around the stake at the end, return through the center, turn the opposite way around the stake, then sprint back through the center, shutting off the time. Failure to follow course or knocking down stake or course marker shall cause a contestant to be eliminated.

POLE BENDING

The course may run starting to the left or right of the pattern, following the line of travel indicated on the pattern. Failure to follow the correct course shall cause a contestant to be disqualified. A 5 second penalty for each pole knocked down.

FLAG RACE

The pattern shall be: to run across the timing line to the first barrel, passing either to the right or left of it, picking up the flag stick, run to the second barrel turning around it either to the left or right, then sprint to the timing line, returning the flag stick to the open-ended barrel passing. Failure to follow the course, knocking over a barrel, or failing to return the flag to the open barrel shall cause a contestant to be eliminated.

KEYHOLE

The rider must turn their horse around in the circle. The rider is not permitted to walk their horse into or out of the circle. The horse is not permitted to touch or cross over the line when completing the keyhole. Failure to follow the course or to step on or out of the circle line will result in elimination.

RULES FOR SHOW:

1. Please pick up your exhibitor's package at the Miniature Horse Information Table, and check your entries to make sure that they are correct.
2. All miniature horses do not need to be registered but must be 38" or less when measured from the last hair on the mane.
3. For halter classes, horses are to be shown in hand

NOTICE TO LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

The following definitions will be used:

EXHIBIT: A unit of livestock qualifying for an entry into a class as specified in this prize list. All purebred registered animals, whether owned by one person or by more than one person (individually or jointly) are considered to be the production of the farm or breeding unit on which they are maintained.

EXHIBITOR: Any breeder or farm which presents animals or farm produce for official placing by a judge at the time specified by the fair for judging.

BREEDING UNIT: In each classification where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation, such operations are considered as ONE breeding unit. In all cases where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitor(s).

PUREBRED: "Purebred" means an animal that is a purebred of the breed as determined by the by-laws of an association authorized to register animals of that breed.

RULES:

1. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- a) Tuberculosis – tests for tuberculosis are not required for cattle originating from:
 - i) accredited herds or
 - ii) herds from accredited areas in good standing
 - b) Brucellosis – cattle from brucellosis free regions may enter without a blood test. B.C. is currently a brucellosis free region. Exhibitors from outside the province should consult their local District Health of Animals Veterinarian to determine the appropriate qualifying certification. Out-of-province cattle **REQUIRE an appropriate health certificate**.
 - c) The barn superintendent, along with the appropriate breed representatives, will inspect all cattle for infectious diseases and/or other contagious and harmful conditions. This committee has the authority to disqualify any infected animals and demand the immediate removal of the animal from the Exhibition Grounds. This applies to ringworm and unsightly warts as well.
2. Animals from the United States, having met import regulations, will be eligible for entry to the Chilliwack Fair. Any animals suspected of having any contagious disease could be ordered removed.
 3. In the event of a dispute, any veterinarian expense incurred shall be at the expense of the party in error.
 4. The Barn Superintendent will inspect the barn before 10 a.m. each day with the best interest of the show and exhibitors in mind. If by 10 a.m. any stall or animal has been neglected, the Superintendent shall have the animal and/or stall cleaned out. The owner/exhibitor will be charged a fee of \$5 per animal or stall. Continued negligence may result in the removal of the animal from the Exhibition.
 5. Exhibitors must furnish their own bedding.
 6. All cattle shown in groups must have previously shown in regular classes.

The Chilliwack Agricultural Society requests:

- That any staples, tacks or tape applied to livestock stalls be removed before take down.
- That all exhibitors clean up after their animals immediately.
- That all vehicles are parked in designated parking areas by 8:30 am. Friday morning. Violators will be towed.
- That no stall decorations are dismantled before 5 p.m. on Sunday. Remember that you are on display for the public until closing time.
