**RULES:**

1. No person is allowed to submit more than one entry in the same class except in class 54.
2. Two or more persons may not exhibit in the same class for prizes from the same garden, orchard, greenhouse, nursery or farm.
3. Multiple entries from one exhibitor must all be harvested from the same garden.
4. Variety as well as name of exhibit should be put on the entry forms so that tags can be made to carry this information.
5. Number of specimens exhibited must be as stated in this prize list.
6. Exhibits will be judged according to the book "Judging Standards" published by B.C. Council of Garden Clubs. This publication may be viewed at the Fair Office.
7. An entry not up to standard may not be accepted for exhibit or judging.
8. Root crops and vegetables shall be delivered to the showroom in clean condition.
9. All wilted or bug infested exhibits will be removed after judging.

20. Cucumbers – slicing or table type, not over 20 cm. (8") 2 specimens, stems attached
21. Cucumbers – long, English type, 2 specimens, stems attached
22. Garlic – 3 bulbs
23. Lettuce – 2 plants, roots on, in water
24. Leeks – 3 specimens
25. Onions – yellow or white, 3 specimens of 1 variety, skins intact, loose scales removed

If you've never done so, and even if you have, Google **ZUCCHINI RACES** and see what you have been missing. This year at the fair we intend to make up for that by holding our Fourth Annual Zucchini Race during the exhibition. It should be a lot of fun, especially for those who participate. There is no need to register early, but an entry fee of a "loonie" donated at the time of entry will create a donation to be given to a local charity. Zucchini Race Cars must be submitted for judging no later than 12 noon on race day, which will be Saturday (and perhaps Sunday if the race cars survive the first day, or sufficient people indicate a desire to build and/or rebuild for another event). Awards may be given for the best decorated and fastest race cars.

**ZUCCHINI RACER SPECIFICATIONS:**

- 1. Race car must be made of a real zucchini and must be the main part of the entry. The zucchini racer may be no wider than 12 inches, including wheels and decorations.
- 2. Wheel axles must be incorporated into the zucchini itself. It's not acceptable to just attach a zucchini to an existing "vehicle" that rolls. This means no attaching a zucchini to a skateboard, roller skate, toy car, etc.
- 3. Zucchini racer must have 3 or 4 wheels. Wheels can be any type – wooden, metal, vegetable, or plastic.
- 4. The front wheels must be independent of the rear wheels.
- 5. Each racer must be self-propelled – no motors or auxiliary propulsion!
- 6. Please create a zucchini racer sturdy enough to compete in multiple races.

**There will be two classes:** One for those 12 and under and another for everyone else. Clearly, it's the more the merrier.

- Exhibits are to be shown in appropriate containers and maintained, to be replaced if wilted; otherwise the show committee has the authority to remove them from the show bench.
- Exhibits must be of good quality; if not, the judge can disqualify poor exhibits.
- All plants must be the property of the exhibitor for at least three months before the Fair.
- All cut flowers must be grown by the exhibitor, with the exception of the Floral Art Classes and Children/Youth.

**Note:**

- Cut your flower stems as long as possible. No buds allowed when bloom is stipulated.
- In order to give educational value, we request that all exhibits be named where possible. In judging, correctly named plants and flowers will have a slight edge on others.

## SECTION B: FLORAL ART

Notes and definitions for show schedules are from the BC Council of Garden Clubs Floral Design and Judging and Exhibiting Standards Manual.

**EXHIBITS:** An exhibit is composed of natural plant material, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified in the schedule.

Backgrounds, bases, containers, drapes, exhibit titles and mechanics may always be included in an exhibit, unless otherwise stated.

**More than one placement may always be included, unless otherwise stated.**

In all exhibits natural plant material must predominate. Natural Plant Material includes: fresh, dried, garden, wild, or made-up plant material, flowers, foliage, fruit, vegetables and seaweed. All may be additionally coloured.

### *The following are the only reasons for disqualification:*

1. Failure to comply with any specific requirement of a class as stated in a show schedule, e.g. the measurements of the components.
2. Inclusion of fresh material that does not have roots or the cut ends of stems in water or water retaining material. Exceptions: air plants, cacti, fruits, grass turf, lichen, moss, succulents, vegetables and long lasting plant material (including strong fibrous stems) WHICH WILL REMAIN TURGID FOR THE DURATION OF THE SHOW (definition of turgid: the state of firmness of plant tissue resulting from adequate moisture, causing the plant cells to be fully expanded)
3. Inclusion of artificial plant material (unless specifically allowed by a show schedule)



**Please Note:** Exhibits not picked up on Sun., August 12 will be available in the Fair office 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. until Thurs., August 16. The office will not be staffed after this date.



**DESIGN:** A floral design consists of fresh cut materials, in a container, with a base if necessary. It may also include dried, weathered, or treated material with or without accessories, with or without fresh cut material. No artificial flowers allowed.

**OPEN CLASS:** Open to all.

**SIZE OF DESIGNS:** When a maximum size of design is specified: for example 'design not to exceed 30" in any one direction' – this is measured from the tabletop vertically and/or across the design from flower tip to flower tip horizontally in all directions. If you are over the maximum size the Judge may disqualify your design. For all other classes that do not specify a maximum size the limit for the arrangement is 24" wide by 36" tall. A fabric covered backdrop of these dimensions may be used if desired but is optional.

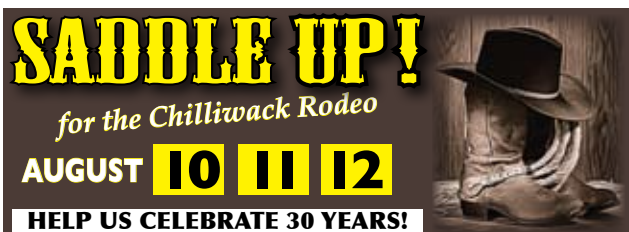
